Who are Transition Kingston?

Transition Kingston is part of a local grassroots movement originating in the UK in response to the challenge of climate change and resource depletion. It's a worldwide web of local community-based efforts to reduce fossil fuel reliance and relocalise economies. A core tenet of the Transition Movement is that people would be happier with more community and less cheap energy (and the culture of stuff that it fuels).

Instead of focusing on what we don't want, the Transition approach is creating positive visions and projects for a sustainable and resilient society. It's going to take a major shift of both systems and minds to get there. Transition Kingston strive to bring these activities to your doorstep. Council Declares Climate and Ecological Emergency

Transition Kingston responded to City of Kingston Draft Integrated Transport Strategy by providing a detailed report. We supported most of the approaches proposed but we were critical of the lack of defined targets or firm actions. We encourage Council to specify and accelerate the range of actions.

Our feedback recommends that Council show leadership in reducing transport emissions to act on the Climate Crisis by replacing all of the ICE (internal combustion engine) vehicles that it uses in its activities. Council should initiate a project changing its use of all vehicles whether council owned or leased from ICE to EV (electric vehicles) by 2025. Charging stations could be put in place to support both the needs of Council and the broader driving community. It must be worked into the budget and contracts as a matter of urgency. This would be a significant step in providing an integrated, safer, healthier and more efficient transport system in Kingston.

Council Elections October 2020

What future will you choose for yourself, your children and grandchildren when you vote in the Kingston Council elections this October?

Previously Kingston has been split into three wards with three councillors elected to represent each ward. At this election, Kingston has been split into 11 wards creating an even greater, localised focus for each councillor.

Consider voting for candidates who will show leadership transitioning the community towards a clean, renewable energy future.

We applaud the declaration of a Climate and Ecological Emergency made by current councillors but now it is time for action. Environment Victoria South Eastern Volunteers put questions to all of the candidates on their views of the role Councils can play in mitigating climate change.

Backyard Sharing Program

Picture this: You're in an apartment with enough room to grow some window-sill herbs, but you'd love the opportunity to get out and grow your own veggies. Just next door is a lovely neighbour who has land to spare, and no time to garden.

The Backyard Sharing program matches local landowners with spare land and gardeners with no land to meet up and share space and produce. Landowners can 'buddy' with a gardener and work in the garden together.

Pam's Veggie Patch

Five tips to make the most of your patch in the next three months

- 1: Reuse your egg shells and coffee grounds as a natural pest deterrent in your veggie patch.
- 2: Try your hand at growing from seed- it is so rewarding!
- 3: Make use of those beautiful worm castings (more commonly known as worm poo) from your worm farm.
- 4: Mulch, mulch, mulch
- 5: Water deeply and less often
